

WELCOME TO AUSTRALIA'S PIONEERING CRUISE LINE

Started in 1983, our company's original vessel, *Coral Princess*, a converted World War II submarine chaser, pioneered and set the standard for small ship expedition cruising in northern Australia with 5-night cruises on the Great Barrier Reef.

Today, the Coral Expeditions' fleet includes three purpose-built small ships that can be found anywhere from the tropical waters of Australia's north to the rugged shores of Tasmania, from the coastal villages of Papua New Guinea and the Spice Islands, to sheltered sounds and glacial fiords of New Zealand.

While our range of cruise itineraries has expanded into new regions, we have maintained our home in Cairns and continue to be the only major operator of extended small ship cruises on the Great Barrier Reef.

NEW SHIPS, NEW DESTINATIONS

A new *Coral Princess* was built in 1988 and *Coral Princess II* followed eight years later, allowing us to pioneer small ship expedition style cruising in the remote and rugged Kimberley. Both vessels were renamed *Coral Expeditions I* and *Coral Expeditions II* in line with the company's 2015 name change, and to better reflect the expedition cruise experience. We were the first operator to introduce onboard interpretive guides to our expeditions and on the strength of growing customer loyalty and demand, we commissioned the build and launch of *Coral Discoverer* (formerly *Oceanic Discoverer*) in 2005. It was with this landmark vessel with global ocean capabilities, built to the highest standards in Australia, that we forged new expedition journeys into Papua New Guinea, New Zealand and the Spice Islands of the East Indies.

INTRODUCING CORAL ADVENTURER AND CORAL GEOGRAPHER

Drawing on the latest technical advances and more than 40 years of expedition cruising experience, our newest vessels, *Coral Adventurer* and *Coral Geographer*, are also designed for blue water ocean explorations to remote areas inaccessible to large cruise vessels. They enable us to visit the farthest reaches of the world away from the well-trodden tourist trails.

They are the largest vessels in our fleet, yet carry a maximum of only 120 guests, preserving the relaxed and intimate atmosphere of every Coral Expeditions adventure.

We proudly manage our Australian flagged and crewed ships to Australian maritime standards and conform to the highest standards of quality, operational redundancy and environmental compliance to be found anywhere in the world.

While our fleet has been completely modernised and our range of cruise itineraries has expanded into new regions, we have maintained our home in Cairns and continue to be the largest and most experienced expedition cruise operator in Australia. Our company is proudly 100% Australian owned and operated and we are the largest employer and trainer of seafarers in the region.


DAME CAROL KIDU

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Dame Carol Kidu, a former teacher, retired from the Papua New Guinea Parliament in 2012 after 15 years in politics. During her career, she held various positions, including Minister for Community Development and Leader of the Opposition. She focused on social development, advocating for legislative and policy reforms with a human rights-based approach, particularly for marginalised and vulnerable populations. After retiring, she remained active internationally, received numerous awards and honours including five Honorary Doctorates, and founded organisations such as the Sir Buri Kidu Heart Institute and the Ginigoada Bisnis Development Foundation. She continues to work as a consultant, primarily on women's political leadership.

QUENTIN CHESTER SOUTH AUSTRALIA | TASMANIA | KIMBERLEY

Quentin has always been fascinated by islands and has a long history of living and exploring various island destinations in Australia, including Kangaroo Island, Encounter Bay, and Dangar Island. EACH NEW DAY BRINGS A NEW ADVENTURE

Deep in the Spice Islands of Indonesia, a small ship is days away from any large ports. In the still of the early morning, all the passengers are gathered expectantly on the foredeck as it approaches a narrow channel hidden among the trees and dotted with islets. There is a lot of excited chatter - everyone already knows everyone as there are no big crowds here - and cameras are at the ready as this is a new destination for the ship, in fact our local guide informs us that no ship has ever been into this anchorage before. Even the most modern charts are not accurate for this area, a myriad of islands and channels; but the ship is small and manoeuvrable and the crew are well trained and confident. Before entering the narrow approach channel, the ship's tender, known as Xplorer, is launched with experienced crew aboard. Some of the passengers take the opportunity to go ahead with them on a recce. What a great photo opportunity, as they lead the ship, surveying the channel depth as they go using a combination of modern navigating technology and a more traditional leadline set up! All the while recording charts for our next visit. The ship follows slowly behind, and with the Xplorer calling the depths, winds its way down the calm, clear waters of the narrow channel. As the ship gets deeper into the labyrinth the view becomes even more spectacular and passenger's cameras are clicking away flat out, both on the foredeck and aboard Xplorer. Limestone cliffs, caves and beehive islands slide past, a few locals in their small craft wave excitedly and wide eyed as we pass. The ship creeps in between towering pinnacles to the inner basin and, exactly in the middle of the inlet, the anchor is lowered to the bottom and the ship brought to rest, perfectly sheltered and secure. This is pure expedition cruising!

AS MUCH ACTION AS YOU WANT

The crew swing into action – Zodiacs are hoisted and lowered, kayaks made ready, Xplorer recovered on the unique aft platform that allows passengers to disembark easily and safely. Guests spend the remainder of the day enjoying a range of activities – snorkelling directly over colourful reefs, exploring the surrounding inlets by kayak or venturing further afield in the myriad of channels in Xplorer. When it's time for a break, our guests come back aboard to refresh with a coffee or cold beer or simply relax on the deck, all without waiting in line. To finish the day, everyone gathers on the Sun Deck for drinks followed by a barbeque on the Vista deck as the sun sets. With no rushed itinerary, the ship overnights in this calm anchorage and everyone gets a good night's sleep ready for a new day of adventure.

That is just one day of an expedition cruise with Coral Expeditions, but it is very typical of what we do. Whether you are cruising with us in the mighty Kimberley, historic Tasmania, wild Papua New Guinea or the exotic Spice Islands, we visit wild and remote areas - the places that other cruise ships do not go to, simply because they cannot. We meet locals who rarely get visitors and are keen to show off their culture. Our guests can snorkel and dive over pristine reefs and get to see firsthand wildlife that few others do - from tawny nurse sharks to birds-of-paradise, from tiny Monjon rock wallabies to enormous whale sharks, from sea eagles to striated herons.

On our expedition cruises you visit areas of incredible history - Aboriginal sites tens of thousands of years old, failed settlements and abandoned forts, traditional fishing villages and landing points of the great maritime explorers.

Leave the crowds behind, make new friends and explore fascinating destinations. Each authentic experience immerses you in the region's nature, culture or history, giving you the chance to explore, discover, relax, and create lifelong cherished memories.













Our small ships have all been designed and built with tropical region expedition cruising in mind and under the guidance of our crew and management team, harnessing our four decades of operating experience and advanced seafaring technology. They are perfectly suited to the unique destinations we explore and are designed take you to some of the most beautiful and remote regions of Australia, the Asia Pacific, South Pacific and the Indian Ocean. On board you will discover a personalised style of cruising. With our ships carrying only 72 to 120 guests, you can say goodbye to queues, long waits, and assigned seating. Instead, enjoy a relaxed, convivial atmosphere shared with like-minded explorers.

We have advanced navigation and propulsion systems, shallow drafts, and active stabilisers to ensure comfortable blue-water cruising and high manoeuvrability so we can access shallow marine environs such as remote reefs, islands, rivers and lagoons with ease to ensure that your expedition experience is the best it can be. All vessels are equipped with our hydraulic Xplorer tender platform which helps us to dispatch all guests simply and safely allowing you to spend more time ashore and out on excursions.


All guest cabins are outside facing with an ensuite bathroom, premium amenities, and the majority have private balcony settings to help you enjoy spectacular vistas on your journey. In addition to well-appointed dining areas, they have a range of indoor and outdoor bar areas which are both spacious and stylish. Each ship has a comfortable lounge area on the bridge deck where guests can relax, attend presentations, and enjoy evening films and activities. Our larger vessels are fitted with a lift and intimate gym and we have recently upgraded the fleet with new technology satellite systems to enable improved Wi-FI connectivity.

Each ship has an open bridge fitted out with guests lounge and navigational workspaces so guests can participate in the voyage planning experience. Without crowds to worry about, our chefs can prepare small-batch meals made with Australian ingredients. Our open galleys located adjacent to the dining room allows guests to interact with our chefs and see meals being freshly prepared. Throughout or ships, we have carefully curated galleries of nature photography and indigenous art and artefacts from the communities we visit.

Our entire fleet are Australian Flagged general licenced vessels, staffed by qualified Australian seafarers and held to the highest standards of operational safety by the Australian Marine Safety Authority.












We carry several boats aboard, but it's really our expedition launch vessels, the Xplorers, that sets us apart from any other operator in the world when it comes to delivering an expedition. It is an aluminium boat that sits on the aft deck and is easily lowered and lifted to the waterline using a heavy-duty hydraulic platform.

The Xplorer accommodates all guests for their shore excursions in a high level of comfort. It is covered from the sun, has comfortable seats and a toilet aboard along with audio equipment for commentary along the way. It is powered by twin 300HP low emission outboard engines with a cruising speed of over 22 knots and a long-range giving us access to the upper reaches of wild river systems and into shallow coral lagoons.









The hydraulic loading platform makes it unique, as we can pick the Xplorer vessel up and lift it to the most suitable deck level, where everyone can simply walk aboard and get seated before we lower her back down into the water and head off on the excursions. The process takes less than 10 minutes in total and negates the need for guests to negotiate stairs and ladders at sea.

To back up the Xplorer we carry between 3 and 6 Zodiacs which can take 10 guests at a time, which allows us to add to the range of excursions we can offer by getting into tighter places or different spots in variable sea conditions. They also allow us to split up the group for more intimate and personal interpretation at special places.

This vast and ancient land, shaped by the powerful forces of nature, is one of the world's most beautiful and awe-inspiring wilderness areas.




The Kimberley is a land steeped in ancient Aboriginal culture, intriguingly portrayed through indigenous rock art estimated up to 60,000 years old.

Dave has spent the past 15 years working as an Eco-Guide and Expedition Leader, allowing him to explore pristine and remote wilderness areas in Australia and the South Pacific while sharing his passion for nature and conservation. He has held roles in various environments, including as a Wilderness Park Ranger in The Kimberley and a Whale Shark and Snorkelling Guide on the Ningaloo Reef. Dave has also managed guiding departments in luxury accommodation venues in Freycinet Tasmania and the Great Barrier Reef. Currently, he is in his seventh year with Coral Expeditions, embarking on adventurous journeys and discoveries in places like the Kimberley Coast, Arnhem Land, Great Barrier Reef, Ningaloo Reef, Tasmania, Indonesia, and Melanesia.

Due to the combination of extremely calm conditions and a suitable tide level, our Expedition Team made the decision to visit Berkeley River and Gorge this morning. What a good decision that turned out to be... We were treated to some clear sightings of fishing behaviour by a couple of rare snub-nosed dolphins in the shadow of the cliffs. A very placid, white-breasted sea eagle was spotted along the mangrove-lined estuary, as well as some deciduous cedar mangroves revealing their autumnal colours. As we rounded a bend in the river, the red/orange 1.8-billion-year-old Warton sandstone bluffs began rearing up close around us. Another treat was our visit to the Red Amphitheatre with a viewing of 2 crocs, the reflections of the magnificent geology pressing in, and a gently tinkling waterfall rounding off the morning.

Day 4 | Swift Bay/Mitchell Falls

A clear and windless day greeted guests travelling to Mitchell Falls by helicopter. After transferring to a nearby beach, they were whisked away for a visit to the magnificent falls up on the plateau via the expansive sandstone savannah country spread out below. Some hardy souls also took a dip in the cool Mitchell River. Our land-based adventures took us to Warrabii East where we needed to scramble up some steep rocky slopes to arrive at a magnificent gallery of mixed art styles, animistic, Gwion Gwion and Wandjina. Expedition team members Richard and James guided us around the gallery and offered some explanations of the wonderful images and the mystery associated with them.













Day 6 | Porosus Creek/Thors Hammer



We anchored in the magnificent Prince Frederick Harbour near the sheer bluff of Indian Head and headed off to the mangrove-lined Porosus Creek for a morning of mud and mangroves, all from the comfort of our shaded Xplorers. The backdrop of rusty-coloured Wunaamin Miliwundi (previously King Leopold) sandstone behind verdant green mangroves made for a great photo opportunity. One group spotted crocodiles early on, while the other group had to wait until on their way home before a great viewing of his apparently open-mouthed bored "yawn" at our close approach.

Our afternoon expedition saw us cruise around Naturalist Island and travel on to visit Thor's Hammer, a geological feature with a King Leopold sandstone 'head' that sits precariously on a 'handle' of cemented rock fragments and quartz crystals, several of which Asha retrieved for closer inspection. A busy pair of ospreys provided some great photos of a pair looking after their rocky perch with a great ocean view, and a couple of green turtles surfaced for a quick check on our progress.

Day 8 | Montgomery Reef and Talbot Bay

As we approached the High Cliffy Isles and the iconic Montgomery Reef some crested terns and fairy martins joined us around the ship. Lindsay provided a very informative talk on the characteristics of this unique inshore coral reef and how it was formed. We also heard about the mystery surrounding the Yayawajaba people, or 'tide riders' who lived on the High Cliffy Isles until 1929. These were a tall group of people who used the marine life of Montgomery Reef as a source of food, but suddenly disappeared from their island homes for no apparent reason. This talk was a great basis for us to embark on the Xplorers for a bumpy short crossing to the 'river', a sheltered drainage channel between two large sections of Montgomery Reef. Despite the rain, we were able to be mesmerised by the emerging reef and the cascading waterfalls as the tide dropped. Several grey and white phase reef egrets were seen feeding on the exposed reef platform.



Day 10 | Nares Point/Crocodile Creek

After crossing to Nares Point, we saw another striking example of the folding sandstone formations in this area, with the sandwiched layers of siltstone being more readily eroded and producing cavities and beach caves behind the beach. On landing, we were able to examine the caves more closely and viewed a couple of microbats seeking shelter in the caves. The two cosmopolitan beach creepers morning glory (Ipomoea) and Canavalia were spreading over the sand. There were several mammal tracks on the beach, most likely the water rat and a bandicoot. Following a cruise down the Canal to view the Koolan Island open-cut mine and ship loader from a distance, we meandered up Crocodile Creek to a lovely little waterhole with accompanying spring-fed waterfalls. The brave among us took a dip in the not-so-warm water. We were told that the name is derived from the shape of a rock at the entrance to the creek, rather than any reptilian inhabitants.

This important cultural heritage now has a well-constructed board walk to enable visitors to view one of the main galleries. Stanley Island is an integral part of the geographical and mythological complex of the Flinders Group. The rock art covering the walls of the ship shelter shows ships from several nations and different periods, painted in red and white ochre on the red sandstone. Phillip Walker, one of the Traditional Owners of Stanley Island showed us the rock art and explained its importance to him and his people.

Day 2 | Melaleuca and Clayton's Corner

After a hearty breakfast we joined the Xplorer for a cruise through the Narrows into Bathurst Harbour up to Melaleuca Inlet. Dale briefed us on the amazing ancient rocks that make up this wilderness area (metamorphosed quartzites 1.4 billion years old). The breeze lessened and we were treated to spectacular reflections of the trees and rocks in the calm water. We divided into smaller groups and headed up to the historic huts, museum and bird hide, and walked along the Needwonee Boardwalk. Luckily we were able to see the endangered orange bellied parrot at the Hide, and several pairs were also spotted along the walk and near the wharf.

Day 3 | Bramble Cove and Maatsuker Island

We joined the Xplorer for an amazing early morning cruise along the coastline of Bramble Cove, Bathurst Harbour and the Breaksea Islands. Conditions were kind and we were treated to close views of the ancient rock formations, sea caves, and bull kelp - while four white bellied sea eagles circled above. The colours of the lichen and algae and sunlight on the twisted and tilted rocks were a photographer's delight!











Day 4 | South Bruny Island and Franklin

After an early breakfast we had a couple of options for exploring the areas around Great Taylor Bay. Some opted for a 4km walk on the Labillardiere Peninsula whilst others opted for a leisurely walk on the beach. Christmas Bells and Peppermint Gums were seen, and a variety of bird songs were heard along the longer walk. The beach walkers came across a variety of interesting marine fauna and flora, including a giant spider crab, an octopus, various fish, and small crabs. After lunch, we headed up the Huon River and visited the Huon Wooden Boat Centre, Frank's Cider House and the old church to view the local sunflower exhibition.

Day 5 | Adventure Bay South Bruny Island

After lunch, we boarded the Xplorer for a cruise past Penguin Island and the blowhole at the base of the Fluted Cape. We were treated to sightings of resting Australian fur seals, a pod of dolphins, and a variety of seabirds. Following a beach landing, we visited the Bligh Museum. Many were able to also take in a walk on the beach and were rewarded with sightings of the hooded plover, pied oystercatchers with a chick as well as a group of chestnut teal ducks.

Day 6 | Maria Island

Today three different walks were on offer: moderate walks to the Fossil Cliffs or the Painted Cliffs, or a short walk to the historic Darlington Settlement. As we approached the island in the Xplorer it became clear that this was a special place.





and led along an avenue of trees to the grounds of the community school. Seated under an L-shaped canopy of pandanus thatch, we were treated to a series of dances by the school children, all dressed in traditional clothing, and then led to a series of different demonstrations of pandanus weaving, sago processing and local cooking. Many of the school teachers and children kindly guided us up the hill behind the school and into their homes, and then the entire community followed us down to the water's edge, where Bosun Bryan revved up the Xplorer's engines, showering the more adventurous kids with spray, to their absolute delight.

Day 4 | Dei Dei (Ferguson Island) & Dobu Island

We took up a position off the smaller conical volcanic island of Dobu, its ash slopes deeply scored by eroded valleys. With volcanoes to our right and left, and geysers and vents elsewhere we were now well within the Ring of Fire! We were also now in the area known as the Kula ring, a traditional network of exchange involving ancient shell and stone valuables in which Dobu Island played a central part. Senior chiefs in the hierarchical societies of these islands continue to participate in these competitive and prestige exchanges which see white armshells called mwali move in a more or less counter-clockwise direction between the D'Entrecasteaux and Trobriand Island groups, against a counter-current of bagi shell necklaces moving clockwise. Dobu is one of the most famous mission stations in PNG, with an old church bearing the name of the first missionary, William Bromilow, and where we were treated to delightful renditions of the national anthem by schoolchildren, followed by dances and a display of Kula valuables, strung out along a pole.













Day 5 | Kuiawa Island (Trobriand Islands)

At 0800 we headed ashore to magical Kuiawa on the Xplorer. Even within the Trobriand Islands, Kuiawa is relatively remote and removed from the main island of Kiriwina, and the local villagers were out in force to greet us. We were given an official welcome and then enjoyed several traditional Trobriand dances and songs performed by all age groups. The costumes, instruments and style of dancing were notably different to anything we had experienced so far. The Trobriands are expert carvers and their style is unique. Proud mothers and sisters would dash out from the crowd to hang shell necklaces over the dancers. As guests were shown through the village by enthusiastic guides there were small stalls along the way where we could purchase our own piece of the Trobriands and take home an expertly made carving or woven basket.

After lunch on board the ship, it was time to get in the water and enjoy some excellent snorkelling on the reef at the entrance to Kuiawa village. Other guests chose to return to shore and spend more time in the village.

Day 6 | Tufi Fjord & Natade Village

Traditional canoes expertly steered by children and led by a magnificent leader standing on a canoe platform to deliver his welcome, ferried us across to a welcome by black-painted warriors and girls throwing petals. On a grassy expanse in the pretty village of Natade, dancers performed for us, dressed in beaten barkcloth or tapa, decorated with ancient clan designs, and sporting elaborate headdresses topped with the plumes of Raggiana birds-of-paradise, cassowary and cockatoos. This was followed by a number of well-designed demonstrations of traditional practices, including the tattooing of women's faces, fire-making, the production and decoration of tapa, and the application of traditional medicines. A stunning range of local artefacts, including lengths of decorated tapa, shell necklaces and string bags, was available in a market that sprang up out of nowhere, and the dancers continued to beat their drums long after we had filed back to the landing and returned to the ship for lunch.

Day 7 | Buna & Sanananda

The Xplorer landed us, much like troops in the war, on the black sand beach of Buna, only we were greeted by a line of beautiful children wearing traditional costumes and placing flower garlands over our heads. We then enjoyed a powerful traditional dance by senior men beating hand drums and women holding sheets of tapa barkcloth over their heads.

From there some walked in groups along the long beach while others took the Xplorer to Buna government station, where we read a number of commemorative plaques put up in memory of fallen US and Australian soldiers. Passing an aircraft wing inserted vertically into the ground, we walked up a long straight road through Buna village, visiting the local medical aid post and a small community museum which had been opened just the day before, stocked with helmets, weapons and the other debris of war found in the surrounding fields.







RAJA AMPAT & SPICE ISLANDS

Day 3 | Cenderawasih Bay | Kwatisore

After an incredible experience with the Whale Sharks, everyone returned to the ship around 10:45 am for light morning tea. Afterward we boarded the Xplorers again to visit Kwatisore Village for a wonderful mid-morning cultural experience. As we arrived, we were greeted by music and dance, and everyone stepped on a wooden paddle – a tradition in the village. We were then led up to the grass where the music continued. After, we gifted supplies to the community, and the dancers performed for us. We then had the opportunity to explore the village and engage in games of football and frisbee with the locals.










At 1330 we began our first snorkel diving on the local coral reef. This was followed by a visit to the local beach for a Sasando Welcome Performance. We enjoyed our first session ashore and were made to feel very welcome. The costumes worn by the local dancers were very beautiful.



In the morning the reef was enjoyed by both snorkel and scuba divers. This was our first opportunity to experience the huge diversity of coral life in the renowned "Coral Triangle" for this trip. After a well-deserved lunch we were ready to begin our exploration of this island of Alor. The ship had come alongside Kalabahi Wharf and we were given a traditional welcome once ashore. Buses then took us through Kadelang City to its Moko Drum Museum and sprawling marketplace. Guides interpreted and led us through the museum and busy marketplace before we once again boarded the buses for our trip out to Latafui Village. We were given a traditional welcome and experienced some of the traditional ceremonies and dances of the village. Refreshments were offered as we had a chance to buy some of the offered cultural artefacts. It was a great chance to see a traditional village and











Day 5 | Pulau Hoga and Wakatobi National Marine Park

Soon after lunch we had the opportunity to explore Hoga Island with its Marine Research Centre. Many also took the opportunity to snorkel or scuba dive on the local coral reef and were rewarded with some beautiful coral and a rich diversity of marine organisms. At 1600 we headed over to Sampella Village. Here we enjoyed a stroll through the sea bound village on the boardwalk to view the houses raised above the ocean on coral platforms. We received a very warm welcome from the locals who were once nomads of the ocean.

Day 6 | Baubau, Sulawesi

We made an early start for the colourful city of Baubau, exploring the extensive Wameo Market, with much fresh local produce on display. The Sulaa Weaving Village gave us an excellent opportunity to view the weavers at work in a very warm and friendly atmosphere. Many of the local children were keen to get selfies with the expeditioners. The Wolio Buton Palace was also visited. The huge fortifications were evidence of previous troubled times. We were given an exceptional welcome in the Buton Palace and provided with some of the local foods, beautifully presented by numerous costumed hostesses.

Day 7 | Tinabu Island

An overnight sail found the ship lying off Tinabu Island - a speck of green amongst the waves. This had not always been the case. Much of the vegetation on this small island has been planted by visitors - including us! Guests were invited to participate in the ongoing restoration process by planting some casuarina seedlings, the success and vigour of the trees was indicated by the fact that some guests (and staff) had already contributed on previous visits. Their trees were well past seedling stage and rocketing skywards. How could they tell? Their names were commemorated on a plaque in front of each tree. Already, birds like Lemon bellied White-eyes could be seen and heard flitting amongst the branches.

Other restoration projects that guests joined in were coral transplanting efforts and the release of a dozen or so hatchling green turtles. Snorkelers found the fringing reef drop-off to be "fishier" than previous sites – proof of the ability of even small protected areas to recover – given time and protection.





Day 4 | Rakiura/Stewart & Ulva Islands

Rakiura /Stewart Island is approximately 85% national park and is home to about 20,000 brown kiwi and 400 resident humans. Ulva Island is also home to kiwis, as well as the endangered saddleback, robins, kaka, weka and mohua (yellowhead). Some of the groups this morning were lucky enough to spot a kiwi casually strolling along the path, probing the ground for tasty invertebrates. Kiwi are usually nocturnal but are often seen during the day on Rakiura.

Day 1 | Milford Sound

The scenery was spectacular with high mountainous peaks all around, some still covered in winter's snow. Soon after driving through the eerie Homer Tunnel, we ascended into Milford Sound, truly an amazing sight to behold. The expedition team met us at Deep Water Cove jetty and quickly transferred us to Coral Adventurer. After lunch Captain Miles sailed us through the glaciercarved fiord and past mighty Mitre Peak, standing at 1692m. He then thrilled us with a close encounter with Sterling Falls - the bow of our ship being just metres from the cliffs. As we cruised further through the sound, a small pod of rather large bottlenose dolphins (up to 3.5m long) accompanied us having lots of fun riding our bow wave.

Day 3 | Dusky Sound

Coral Adventurer pulled up her anchor and glided over to Resolution Island - the site of an amazing effort during the 1890's to save the flightless Kakapo and Kiwi from introduced predators. We were all certainly eager to board the Xplorers once again for a cruise to Pigeon Island, where Richard Henry set up his house for his 14-year stay transferring over 750 of the endangered birds to the newly established Resolution Island sanctuary. Next, we cruised over to a secluded cove called Luncheon Cove where Mark and Mateo explained the extraordinary history of New Zealand's first sealing gang, first permanent dwelling and first ship built (in 1792), and NZ's first shipwreck and marooning of 35 people (in 1795). We also enjoyed rides in the Zodiacs maneuvering into the small bays and coves for close-up views of New Zealand fur seals, reef egrets, variable oystercatchers and beautiful bull kelp swaying in the swell.











A small group accompanied Mateo for a great trip along Otago Peninsula - they had fantastic views over the Southern Ocean, visited a penguin rehabilitation sanctuary, cruised along the back roads past lagoons and bays, and visited the city's iconic sites. Meanwhile, a second group accompanied Mark to discover a more in-depth look at the city and its heritage. We visited Baldwin St, which is officially the world's steepest street; the university clock tower and railway station with their incredible architecture; Signal Hill and Olveston House; and even large sandstone sculptures at the mouth of the harbour in the shape of molars. Some passengers chose to just spend the morning casually strolling the streets of George and Princes St, doing a little bit of shopping and taking in the sights of this historic city.

Day 7 | Kaikoura

The reason for our visit today, of course, was to view the majestic Sperm Whale – it's mostly the bachelor males who live in this area. The males can grow up to 18m long and weigh up to 40 tonnes. Our catamaran, Wheketere (meaning fast squid) took all of us approximately 20km out to sea in search of the elusive cetacean. Captain Puki had the hydrophone in the water several times listening for their echolocation clicks. As the tension and excitement grew, he suddenly announced that a whale had been spotted. It was a Sperm Whale – Zeus. We watched him floating on the surface, taking in huge lungfuls of air and slowly reoxygenating his body after the last 45 minute dive. Definitely, a privilege to have such a close encounter with this amazing creature.

Art themed

CAPE YORK & ARNHEM LAND - ART THEMED 11 NIGHTS | OCTOBER 2024

Commencing in Darwin, voyage to the Tiwi Islands, and experience unique cultural performances and learn the history of the islands. A visit to Tiwi Designs, one of the oldest and most artistically diverse art centres in Australia, reveals the rich artistic heritage in stunning carvings, paintings, and fabric printing. At Maningrida, visit the Arts Centre, the Djomi Museum, and the Bábbarra Women's Centre. Be welcomed to remote townships on Elcho Island, and visit the Elcho Island Art Centre at Galiwin'ku. Each stop is another opportunity to experience the creative expression of one of the world's oldest cultures and hear their stories. We continue on to the Torres Strait Islands. Here you will witness the traditional and contemporary blend of Torres Strait art forms. At the very tip of Australia, enjoy champagne as you look south toward the Great Barrier Reef. As we approach the end of our expedition, see rock art from the contact period at rugged Stanley Island, and have an opportunity to snorkel at vibrant reefs. Join Coral Expeditions on this exciting expedition to the far reaches of Australia's Northern coastline.



Science themed

CITIZEN SCIENCE ON THE GREAT BARRIER REEF - TURTLES & RAYS

10 NIGHTS | MARCH 2024 & 2025

Join Coral Expeditions as we undertake our 3rd unique science themed expedition along the length of the Great Barrier Reef to learn about two iconic species – Turtles and Rays. With a maximum of 70 guests and with leading research experts onboard, our small expedition ship *Coral Discoverer* will call on remote reefs, islands, and significant wildlife habitats in the Coral Sea marine zone.

Along the way get hands on experience with marine conservation at the Mon Repos Turtle Centre in Bundaberg and as you meet with resident researchers at work. Connect with the Project Manta team in the protected "green zone" sanctuary of Lady Elliot Island. Participate in species surveys on guided snorkelling sessions at the John Brewer and Ribbon Reefs. Travel with a community of conservation-minded explorers and gain access to far reaching atolls and reefs such as Orpheus, Middle Percy and Heron Islands. Contribute to conservation programs including biodiversity databases, wildlife rehabilitation and coral science throughout the voyage.

CITIZEN SCIENCE ON THE GREAT BARRIER REEF OCTOBER 2023

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Coral Expeditions announces the next edition of the 'Citizen Science' series as we undertake an immersive scientific expedition exploring the outer reefs and unique marine ecosystems of the Great Barrier Reef, in partnership with Australian Geographic. Departing Cairns with only 66 guests and researchers, our small expedition ship *Coral Discoverer* will visit remote reefs and wildlife habitats in the Coral Sea.

Learn about marine conservation work at the Turtle Rehabilitation Centre on Fitzroy Island as you meet with resident scientists at work along the way. Travel with a community of conservation-minded explorers and special guest lecturer Adam Smith of Reef Ecologic, who will share his extensive scientific and ecological knowledge. Gain access to far reaching and rarely visited atolls and reefs such as Holmes, Tregrosse and Diamond Reefs while contributing to conservation programs including biodiversity databases. Explore the historic *Foam* shipwreck with a senior maritime archeologist. Combine environmental impact and an expedition holiday on this hands-on journey of science and conservation.

WORLD HERITAGE ISLANDS OF THE SUB-ANTARCTIC DECEMBER 2024


