We recommend that you arrive at the embarkation port on the day prior to departure and schedule your own travel arrangements for the following disembarkation due to unexpected changes that may occur in scheduling.

ITINERARY: 12 NIGHTS > BETWEEN BROOME & FREMANTLE

DEPART BROOME OR FREMANTLE

Board in Fremantle at 8:00am for a 9:00am departure. Board in Broome at 4:00pm for a 5:00pm departure.

This is an indicative itinerary covering remote areas. Your Expedition Team will make changes to the daily schedule as necessary to maximise guest experience. This itinerary includes two days at sea.

DAMPIER ARCHIPELAGO

The 42 islands and islets of the Dampier Archipelago are ironred, in bright contrast to the turquoise waters which surround them. With exceptional natural beauty and significant National Heritage Listed sites, the region offers an extraordinary expedition experience. The Yaburara people have lived here for thousands of years, evidenced by historic rock engravings and shell middens.

Search for ancient Aboriginal petroglyphs, swim in the vibrant blue water or relax on a leisurely kayak. Look for native wildlife - the largest hawksbill turtle rookery in the Indo-Pacific region is close by and we may spot the elusive Rothschild's rock wallaby. Birdwatchers will have the opportunity to see several species of migratory waders as well as sea eagles and ospreys.

MONTEBELLO ISLANDS

More than 250 limestone islands and islets off the coast of the Pilbara, the Montebello Islands are an Important Bird Area, supporting significant populations of fairy and roseate terns.

The islands have an 'explosive' past - Alpha and Trimouille Islands were the site of British atomic weapons tests in the 1950s, and relics of these operations can still be found on the islands, which are now a wildlife haven. Spend a day exploring - swimming from the beach, visiting the atomic Ground Zero and spotting wildlife including the rufous hare-wallaby and lagoon rays.

SERRURIER ISLAND & PILBARA INSHORE ISLANDS

Serrurier Island is one of the 170 remote Pilbara inshore islands, and is protected as a nature reserve. The coral competition here is fierce, as is the fish species diversity. Sea-grass beds feed dugongs and several species of marine turtle. Today is all about the in water experience as we snorkel this pristine and seldom visited location.

MUIRON ISLANDS

The Muiron Islands are well known for their incredible reef, with a variety of dive sites on offer, including swim-throughs and ledges where nudibranchs, eels and angelfish hide. Discover a variety of colourful soft corals, an abundance of turtles, schools of fish and sightings of manta rays. Birdlife is abundant onshore - spot wedgetail shearwaters, roseate terns, osprey, and black-shouldered kites. After in-water activities, stretch your legs on a stroll down the beach on these untouched islands.

EXMOUTH & CAPE RANGE NATIONAL PARK

Ningaloo Reef's deep waters, reef and coast are in close proximity, resulting in diverse marine life. Humpback whales, giant manta rays, and whale sharks come here during their migrations, and is an important turtle rookery. Here, there is a significant history of explorers, pearlers, whaling and fishing. Spend time in Cape Range National Park with snorkelling at Turquoise Bay, a 1.2 km nature walk at Yardie Creek, and a visit to the Vlamingh Head lighthouse. Enjoy free time to explore Exmouth and the Ningaloo Discovery Centre.

CRUISING THE NINGALOO COAST

The remote and well-hidden Bateman's Bay, just north of Coral Bay, is a much more remote and untouched landscape in comparison with beautiful sand beaches. Weather permitting we will make a short landing on the remote Ningaloo coast between Northwest Cape and Shark Bay, for a swim and a beach comb.

SHARK BAY WORLD HERITAGE AREA

Shark Bay World Heritage Area was the first location in Western Australia to receive UNESCO World Heritage status. Known for colourful landscapes and rare flora and fauna, the region is home to 35% of Australia's bird species. Explore Francois Peron National Park and walk the Wanamalu Trail to spot wildlife from the lookout, taking in the vivid contrasts of the orange dunes with turquoise waters. Cruise past Cape Inscription Lighthouse, where Dirk Hartog came ashore in 1616 - the first recorded landing by Europeans on Australian soil.

THE ABROLHOS ISLANDS

The Abrolhos Islands lie in the south-flowing Leeuwin current, a meeting place for diverse sea life. The reefs around the islands have caused many shipwrecks, such as the famous Batavia in 1629.

Spend 3 days exploring three of Abrolhos island groups. At the Wallabi group, land at picturesque Turtle Bay to explore the marked snorkel trail. Conditions permitting we will also visit Beacon Island, site of the Batavia massacre - 'the island of Angry Ghosts'. At the Easter Group, enjoy birdwatching and get up close with friendly sea lions. In the Pelsaert group, visit Liddon Pearls and learn about pearl cultivation and the crayfishing industry from a 4th generation fishing family.

ARRIVE FREMANTLE OR BROOME

Disembark in Fremantle at 8:00am
Disembark in Broome at 8:00am

A post cruise transfer to the city or airport is included.

TRIP LOG

"Leaving Beacon Island, the Explorers then took us the very short distance to Long Island, where many of us enjoyed a magnificent snorkel escorted by a very curious sea lion who seemed to be as curious of us as we were of them.

Another group walked over some of Long Island and viewed an adult sea lion with a pup and another juvenile sea lion sunbaking a short distance away.

Whilst this was taking place our small dive team went to the site of the wrecked Batavia and were able to spot the various cannon and anchors, now heavily covered in marine growth after almost 400 years. Back aboard again for a wonderful lunch which was rapidly followed by the ship getting under way north for our next destination, the wonderful and much anticipated Shark Bay."



ITINERARY: 12 NIGHTS > BROOME TO BROOME

DEPART BROOME

Board in Broome at 4:00pm for a 5:00pm departure.

This is an indicative itinerary covering remote areas. Your Expedition Team will make changes to the daily schedule as necessary to maximise guest experience.

ROWLEY SHOALS

At the edge of the continental shelf, 170 nautical miles offshore, lie the Rowley Shoals. A chain of three coral atolls including Clerke, Mermaid and Imperieuse Reefs, the shoals offer some of the best snorkelling and diving opportunities in the world. Their shallow lagoons are inhabited by myriad coral species and marine life, including giant potato cod, Maori wrasse, at least 233 species of coral and 688 species of fish. Diving along the outside edge of the shoals one can view colourful soft corals, hammerheads and pelagic fish. Water clarity here is unparalleled, making for superb underwater photography opportunities.

Conditions permitting, we will spend 1-2 days here for snorkelling and diving opportunities. Guided by our on-board marine biologist, snorkel the day away in the coral gardens of the Aquarium at Clerke Reef, dive along the sheer vertical walls and through coral canyons, or try a drift snorkel in the channel.

DAMPIER ARCHIPELAGO

Consisting of 42 islands and islets, 25 of which are nature reserves; The iron-red islands of the Dampier Archipelago stand in bright contrast to the turquoise waters which surround them. The archipelago not only offers exceptional natural beauty but significant sites for Aboriginal and European Heritage, many of which are in National Heritage Listed Areas. Named after English explorer William Dampier who first visited the islands aboard the Cygnet in 1699; the islands' earliest inhabitants were the Yaburara people, as is evidenced by the thousands of rock engravings, shell middens and stone arrangements scattered across the area.

On our first visit, local rangers and Traditional Owners will join you onboard for a Welcome to Country, and an information session before joining you ashore at the Burrup Peninsula's Conzinc Bay where you will learn the local history and view the petroglyphs inscribed in rocks.

There will be ample opportunity to explore the area's historical and cultural sites before taking to the azure waters for swimming and kayaking. Birdwatchers will have the opportunity to see several species of migratory waders as well as sea eagles and ospreys. With luck, we may even see the elusive Rothschild's rock wallaby.

*Please note viewing of aboriginal petroglyphs is subject to approval and guidance by traditional owners of the area, and cannot be guaranteed.

PILBARA INSHORE ISLANDS

The Pilbara inshore islands are made up of 170 islands, islets and rocks between Exmouth Gulf and Cape Preston. These remote islands are an important refuge for threatened species and their surrounding reefs are rarely visited. In addition to the more well known Muiron Islands, we may also visit the waters around Serrurier Islands. The coral competition at Serrurier Island is fierce, and sea-grass beds feed dugongs and several species of marine turtle.

NINGALOO REEF & CAPE RANGE NATIONAL PARK

The World Heritage-listed Ningaloo Reef is the turquoise jewel in the crown of the Western Australian coastline. Spanning over 5,000 square kilometres, this is one of the largest fringing reefs in the world. Its inner and outer reefs create a diverse range of habitats for vibrant corals and more than 500 species of fish.

This is also where marine life comes to feed during their migrations, including humpback whales and giant manta rays. It is also a coastline with a fascinating heritage, where lonely whalers battled it out against the elements.

We will spend 2 days exploring this stunning coastline of the northwest cape and its underwater playground. From Exmouth, take a coach tour to discover Cape Range National Park, enjoy a nature walk at Yardie Creek, and visit the Vlamingh Head lighthouse. A visit to the educational Ningaloo Centre prepares you for an incredible experience of snorkelling from the beach at Turquoise Bay, and a boat charter with a local operator to discover the outer reef with the opportunity to snorkel with manta rays, turtles and the majestic whale shark*. There may be an opportunity for advanced divers to discover the Navy Pier dive, depending on tides. As we cruise the 'Humpback Highway' down the coast, we have the opportunity to watch these majestic whales breach close by.

*Whale sharks will not be seen on September departures. Guests will only have the chance to swim with whale sharks during May departures. Peak whale shark season starts in March through to the end of July.

MUIRON ISLANDS

Located approximately 10 nautical miles off the North West Cape, the waters surrounding the uninhabited Muiron Islands are teeming with marine life. A variety of dive sites are on offer, including swim-throughs and ledges where nudibranchs, eels and angelfish hide. With fantastic bommies and protected reefs, snorkellers will appreciate the variety of soft corals and gorgonians as well the incredible fish life. After in-water activities, stretch your legs on a stroll down the beach on these untouched islands.

MONTEBELLO ISLANDS


The Montebello Islands or 'Montes' are an archipelago of more than 250 limestone islands and islets off the coast of the Pilbara. A twitcher's delight, the islands are considered an Important Bird Area, as they support over 1% of the world populations of fairy and roseate terns, as well as Sooty Oystercatchers.

The islands also have a fascinating maritime history. The survivors of the Dutch vessel Trial swam here after their ship was wrecked in 1622, being the first Europeans to land on the islands. The Montes have an 'explosive' past – Alpha and Trimouille Islands were the site of three British atomic weapons tests in the 1950s. Relics of the military operation can still be found on the islands today.

Over the course of your cruise we will spend 1-2 days at this island group, exploring its historical sites and viewing it's wild landscapes.

ARRIVE BROOME

Our incredible adventure concludes in Broome this morning as we arrive and disembark at 8:00am. Bid farewell to new-found friends, the Captain and crew. A post-cruise transfer to Broome CBD, Cable Beach or airport is included. If you're not transferring directly to the airport why not spend the day visiting world-famous Cable Beach or stroll the historic streets of Chinatown in central Broome.

ITINERARY: 12 NIGHTS > BETWEEN DARWIN & BROOME

DEPART DARWIN OR BROOME

Board in Darwin at 8:00pm for a 9:00pm departure. Board in Broome at 4:00pm for a 5:00pm departure.

This is an indicative itinerary covering remote areas. Your Expedition Team will make changes to the daily schedule as necessary to maximise guest experience. The following itinerary shows departing Darwin and arriving Broome. For the opposite direction, the itinerary is in reverse.

KING GEORGE RIVER

Cruise down the scenic King George River, through steep-sided gorges carved by a flooded river system that carved a swathe through the Kimberley landscape 400 million years ago. We will take the opportunity to get up close and view the honeycomb erosion patterns of the 80m tall sandstone cliffs.

A DAY OF ROCK ART

Today we will land at either Jar Island, Swift Bay, Wollsaton Bay or Bigge Island. Each of these locations are home to fantastic Wandjina and Gwion Gwion Rock Art (Bradshaw) galleries.

Stretch your legs and explore the magnificent sandstone structures, providing an abundance of rock shelters. On the walls of these shelters is where we will find examples of this rock art.

ASHMORE REEF

The territory of Ashmore and Cartier Islands is made up of the West, Middle and East Islands of Ashmore Reef, as well as Cartier Island and the surrounding 12 nautical mile territorial sea. These islands are uninhabited, making them the perfect location for seabird breeding. Each year around 100,000 seabirds flock to the marine parks three tiny islands. The reef here boasts a wide diversity of marine life, including over 70 fish species and 255 varieties of coral. To protect this reef, the Australia Government declared the Ashmore Reef National Nature Reserve in 1983. The islands also have a significant marine turtle nesting area and migratory bird populations.

Here we will spend time birdwatching, swimming and snorkelling the remote marine reserve.

SCOTT REEF

A group of four separate reef structures including Scott Reef South, Scott Reef Central, Scott Reef North and Seringapatam Reef - These atolls are situated on the continental shelf in the Timor Sea. Weather and tide permitting we will snorkel and dive the outer reef - The sheer walls and diverse ecosystems of this acclaimed coral habitat will take your breath away! Enjoy nature and history interpretations from your Expedition Team.

ADELE ISLAND

Weather and tide permitting we will visit the remote and beautiful Adele Island. Pristine, teeming with breeding bird and supported by coral reef that surrounds it, Adele Island was declared a Nature Reserve in 2001. Adele Island is recognised for its bird breeding sanctuary, classified by BirdLife International as an Important Bird Area for its seabirds and waders.

Adele Reef is one of the more unique reef habitats on the planet, with exclusive discoveries reported in this area. This area is of great scientific interest as it provides an environmental link between the Kimberley's oceanic and inshore reef systems.

MONTGOMERY REEF

Montgomery Reef covers over 300 sq km. As the sea recedes in mammoth tides, the reef rises from the ocean in a cascade of rushing water. Opportunistic birds take advantage of the marine life left exposed in rock pools, and turtles and larger marine life may also be spotted. Witness the spectacle up close, as our Expedition Team share their knowledge on the reef and wildlife.

DOUBTFUL BAY

Depending on the tides we will visit Red Cone Creek, which flows gently downstream until it meets the small but impressive Ruby Falls. Named by local mariner Capt. Chris Tucker after his daughter, Red Cone Creek is carved through rock formations stacked atop each other like building blocks. These rock walls are great for climbing and clambering over before reaching a series of freshwater swimming holes and waterfalls. The falls may be a gurgling torrent or a gentle trickle, depending on the time of the year.

If traditional owner guides are available we may visit Wijingarra Bard Bard (Freshwater Cove) with a hike to the hinterland to view rock art at Cyclone Cave.

HORIZONTAL FALLS AND BUCCANEER ARCHIPELAGO

The Horizontal Falls are one of the Kimberley's biggest attractions and are a result of the mammoth 11m tides for which the Kimberley is renowned. Naturalist David Attenborough described the Horizontal Falls as 'one of the greatest natural wonders of the world.' This natural phenomenon has been created as the ocean thunders through a narrow gorge in the McLarty Ranges. Water builds up on one side and is forcibly pushed through the bottleneck, creating a rushing horizontal waterfall of swiftly flowing seawater. Riding the rapids on our Zodiac inflatable tenders is one of the highlights of our Kimberley expedition cruises.

Talbot Bay is at the heart of the Buccaneer Archipelago, where rocks on the 800 or so islands are estimated at over 2 billion years old. At Cyclone Creek, you will see evidence of massive geological forces in the impressive rock formations and cruise through the Iron Islands past Koolan Island.

THE LACEPEDE ISLANDS

The Lacepede Islands are a protected class-A nature reserve and are significant as a seabird nesting rookery for brown boobies and roseate terns. Other species often sighted at the Lacepedes include Australian Pelicans, frigate birds, egrets and gulls. The four low-lying islands are also an important breeding and nesting habitat for green turtles. If weather and tide conditions are suitable, we will explore the lagoons by Xplorer and Zodiac tender vessels.

ROWLEY SHOALS

At the edge of the continental shelf, 170 nautical miles offshore, lie the Rowley Shoals, a chain of three coral atolls including Clerke, Mermaid and Imperieuse Reefs. The shoals offer some of the best snorkelling and diving opportunities in the world. Their shallow lagoons are inhabited by myriad coral species and marine life, including giant potato cod, Maori wrasse, at least 233 species of coral and 688 species of fish. Water clarity here is unparalleled, making for superb underwater photography opportunities. Conditions permitting, we will spend 1-2 days at Clerke, with ample time for snorkelling and diving opportunities. With each atoll covering approximately 90sg km, there will be plenty to see! Guided by our on-board marine biologist, snorkel away the day in the coral gardens of the Aquarium at Clerke Reef, or dive along the sheer vertical walls and through coral canyons. If time and tide permit, we may also visit Bedwell Island, with a chance to look out for the rare red-tailed tropicbird.
