### YOWJAB (MONTGOMERY REEF)

"As we travelled up the inlet into Montgomery Reef, the coral reef was beginning to appear on both sides of us. The origins of the reef were explained and we began to see some of the wildlife associated with the reef, such as turtles and birds. We spotted grey-tailed tattlers and eastern reef egrets. Very soon the reef was well above us as the tide continued to fall. The spectacle of the water pouring off the reef in great cascades was awesome. his was another of the unique icons of the Kimberley, made possible by the huge tidal movements." ### LACEPEDE ISLANDS

"The most prominent bird species was the brown booby and a few of these had produced chicks some of which were fluffy white and as big as their parents. Some of the other species we saw included the Australian pelican, pied oyster catchers, common noddies, eastern reef egrets, ruddy turnstones, Caspian terns, crested terns, silver gulls, lesser frigate birds, pied cormorants, and a number of wader species. 


